Enrichment within the curriculum	All students have the opportunity to develop their performance skills on a wide variety of instruments, including the voice, keyboards, guitar and percussion, including African drums. Students also have the opportunity to explore how Music Technology can further their musical knowledge and understanding. Students should ideally be receiving instrumental lessons outside of lesson time on an instrument of their choice to support the GCSE Performing (30%) requirements.

Extra-curricular opportunities	Students have the opportunity to take part in various extra-curricular clubs throughout the week. The all-years choir works towards the Carol Service, Gotta Sing, and a summer performance. The school production is an exciting opportunity for those interested in acting and theatre. The School of Rock is open to all years. These clubs are open to all levels of ability, but enthusiasm is essential! Each year, we hold a Carol Service at Pershore Abbey, and we hope lots will participate as part of a mass choir. We also encourage pupils to form their own ensembles, which will be supported by Music department staff where possible. Year 10 and 11 students also have the opportunity to showcase their skills in coursework presentations and through workshops.

Impact on personal development (SMSC)	Students learn to develop resilience and determination through the challenge of performing and composing work, and grow in confidence through performance assessments which are conducted in an encouraging and supportive classroom environment that celebrates achievement. Students develop their group work skills and learn how to collaborate, lead others and be part of a bigger ensemble.					
Preparation for the next	Students can study Music at Key Stage 5 level, as well as taking graded exams if they have instrumental or vocal tuition. Music develops a huge number of highly valuable transferrable skills which are well-regarded in many
